Clare Jennings Swims the Ultra

On 17th February 2024, Iceberger Clare Jennings competed in the annual Ultra24 swim marathon on



the Mornington Peninsula. The U24 Marathon was inaugurated in February 2022 and was conceived as an alternative to the Rottnest Channel swim due to COVID travel restrictions at the time.

The swim offers relay, 24km and 12km options. Clare chose the 12km option and completed her swim from Tootgarook (Capel Sound) to Sorrento in a time of 4 hours and 20 minutes. Well done Clare!

Olympian Fanny Durak – Swimming Legend

Sarah Frances "Fanny" Durack (1889 - 1956) was Australia's first great female swimmer and, from 1910 until 1918, was the world's greatest female swimmer across all distances from freestyle sprints to one mile, having broken 12 world records during this time. Her success did much to promote women's swimming. Durack learned to swim at Sydney's Coogee Baths.

The 1912 Summer Olympics in Stockholm were the first Olympics to include women's swimming. Durack and fellow Coogee local, Mina Wylie, were initially refused permission to compete but were later allowed to attend provided they bore their own expenses. They organised local fundraising events for themselves as well as for the obligatory chaperones to get themselves to Stockholm.



At the Games, Durack (pictured left) set a new world record in the heats of the 100-metre freestyle. She won the final, becoming the first Australian woman to win an Olympic gold medal in a swimming event.

Durack was posthumously inducted into the International Swimming Hall of Fame in 1967 and in 2022 was an inaugural inductee into the Swimming Australia Hall of Fame.
